



Major Concerns

- 1. Promoting self-directed learning and strengthening STEAM education to enhance students' creativity and problem-solving abilities.
- 2. Establishing a mental health campus and strengthening parental education to enhance students' resilience.

Major Concern 1: Promoting self-directed learning and strengthening STEAM education to enhance students' creativity and problem-solving abilities.

Summary of Feedback and Follow-up from the Previous School Year:

(In the first year of a development cycle, schools generally do not need to complete this section. - More than five subject panels have incorporated STEAM elements and used information technology in lessons to enhance students' learning interest, problem-solving skills, and self-directed learning abilities. In the coming year, General Studies will be split into Humanities and Science subjects for Primary One and Primary Four. Subject panels will continue to use STEAM as part of the curriculum.
- Students enjoy activities that integrate STEAM. This year, coordination will continue across subjects to organize or co-organize STEAM-related activities to further strengthen students' problem-solving abilities.
- Students are generally able to use information technology flexibly and effectively to support their learning. Subject teachers will discuss IT-based learning activities during co-planning meetings to improve learning outcomes.
- A STEAM Learning Group will be established this year to hold regular meetings, allowing members to discuss STEAM-related topics. This aims
 to foster a STEAM learning atmosphere in the school, promote student initiative in learning, and enhance the effectiveness of self-directed
 learning.

- The library hosted four themed book exhibitions, with teachers introducing books through various activities. Weekly story-sharing sessions were held every Wednesday at the English Corner, where teachers guided students in reading techniques and fostered engagement and reading habits.
- Across all grade levels, students joined reading clubs during Multiple Intelligence classes. Activities included drama performances to explore texts interactively.
- Plans are underway to install electronic devices in the library for students to read or listen to national security education materials independently, encouraging regular reading.
- There are plans to hold national security-themed book exhibitions, translate more braille books related to national security, and organize sharing sessions to introduce these books to students. These initiatives aim to deepen students' understanding of the rule of law and national affairs, highlight the importance of safeguarding national security, and strengthen their sense of national identity.

- Organize specialized workshops for parents on training techniques to support children with varying degrees of visual impairment in daily self-care and independent living.
- Visually impaired students have diverse needs beyond vision, including sensory, psychological, emotional, and social aspects, which require attention from both school and parents. The school will continue to offer various parent workshops and activities to provide comprehensive support across these areas.
- Regularly review and update the parent learning platform. In the coming year, targeted workshops will focus on one to two specific topics to help parents easily grasp and apply practical skills.
